#### Reason to Race

Around the middle of the year there is often a great flurry of sporting activity being the end of the season for some and the start of the season for others. Sport can be big business these days and that can have the cosequence of making it unaffordable for participants, for clubs and for major tournament organisers. There must have been great disappointment for many fans and competitors alike when they found that the 'Friendly Games', the Commonwealth Games, scheduled for next year, were without a host after the Australian state of Victoria withdrew because of the cost. For those who love sport, there must have been great relief when Glasgow stepped forward as a host city. I say a relief for those who love sport, but truth be told, those not usually interested in sports find themselves caught in the spirit of major events and children often find new sporting heroes to emulate.

St Paul, in his letters often likens the Christian life to a contest or a race, e.g. in 1 Corinthians 9, Galatians 2, Philippians 2, 2 Timothy 2. Although such metaphors should not be overly extended, they can help us to see some important truths about how we might live our lives and to remind us that there is a reward for those who 'run' faithfully. Interestingly, the New Testament imagery of the race is rarely about competitiveness, but rather successful completion. Even when the text is written in competitive terms (e.g. 1 Corinthians 9: 24-27), the emphasis remains on winning through and the suggestion is that all who persevere are 'winners'.

St Paul saw himself as being prepared well by God, who goes to great lengths to ready him

for his arduous 'races', his missionary journeys. Stories of moral courage and physical endurance come to light, when the ideals of the Commonwealth Games and the Olympic Games are being upheld or when athletes show great integrity as well as determination – then they are truly heroic figures. Eric Liddel, a devout Scottish Christian who 'ran for the glory of God' and Harold Abrahams, an English Jew who ran to overcome prejudice, were both immortalised in the film Chariots of Fire.

Jesse Owens, the African-American athlete, who won four gold medals in the 1936 Olympic Games, stood up to racism at home and in Nazi Germany. There are many other accounts of personal sacrifice and determination inspiring others, and sadly some stories of cheating leading to disgrace and ignominy – the easy option does not bring glory.

There are probably a multitude of reasons why competitors set themselves the goal of competing in events from amateur weekend leagues to the Olympics and Paralympics, but all must go to extraordinary lengths even to get fit enough to take part, do well enough to be selected for the team, or to qualify, and then complete the event to the best of their ability as an individual and as part of the team.


In Hebrews 12, the author opens by identifying the need for 'encouragement' and urges us to consider Jesus, who endured the cross for our sake so we 'may not grow weary or lose heart' (v3). The chapter develops idea of being disciplined in our lifestyles, rather like athletes are, and for training as part of that discipline to yield 'the peaceful fruit of righteousness'.

Serious athletes and fun-runners alike, are rewarded for their efforts by gaining respect and recognition, and just occasionally medals. For those who are running the race of a loving life, the reward is God's love now and for ever. And, wherever we are in the course of that race, we can experience that fruitful love, especially when we do what we can to make life fuller and better for others too. We become Christian winners, not by cheating, or beating others, but by pressing on in the best and most unselfish way we can, loving God and serving others.



# **Death of Mrs Joy Prideaux**

The Revd Humphrey Prideaux writes:

'In 1993 Joy and I married. We both taught at Price's Sixth Form College, which became Fareham college. In 1994 we retired, and I was appointed non-stipendiary priest-in-charge of West Meon and Warnford. It was a big change for us. Our new married life was like a second innings. I could not have done the job without Joy. One person wrote, "Joy was one of those kind people who made you feel completely at ease." We are grateful for the support from people in the two parishes - the churches, the surgery, the school... Many of them have died and are now in the clearer presence of God. We are grateful for glad and sad memories. The new rectory was built. Someone said, 'Why the high wall? Are they going to have orgies?' The celebration of the Millenium was a great party. Joy helped with the Over Sixties, the Summer Fete, the Christmas Fair, and in village tragedies. We visited the Holy Land on a 'churches together' pilgrimage. Joy slept with £700 in shekels in her money belt. Betty Taylor rode a camel. Peggy Appleton swam in the Dead Sea. No Shorts allowed in The Church of The Beatitudes. Mines at the Syrian border. Storm on The Sea of Galilee. We also went to Ghana – visits to our link school, a hospital, a theological college, and a hot three-hour service. When Joy's arthritis started, we bought our



first caravan. In 2003 we retired (again) to Alverstoke, where I still minister. In 2017 Joy had a severe accident. In spite of pain and disability she continued gardening, crocheting, patch-work and caravanning. The family expanded. Last year she had three new great granddaughters. In January we celebrated her 90th birthday. On 26th March Joy was taken in an emergency to Queen Alexandra Hospital, and she died on 28th of heart failure. On 24th April we celebrated her life at her funeral in St Mary's Church, Alverstoke. God bless Joy and all of us, as we trust he does. Revd Humphrey Prideaux

# Celebrating notable anniversaries

There will be some exciting anniversaries celebrated at this year's West Meon Music Festival – from well-known composers to Hampshire's own Jane Austen, with the 250th anniversary of her birth being marked with a major new work.



The festival, founded by the renowned Primrose Piano Quartet and now in its 15th year will be performing in Meon Valley churches from 11th to 14th September.

The opening concert on 11th September will mark the 50th anniversary of the death of Dmitri Shostakovich, one of the most remarkable and popular composers of the twentieth century, with a performance of his Second Piano Trio. Completed in 1944, the work reflects on the horrors of the Second Word War and is supremely moving.

On Friday the 12th September the attention will shift to the 150th anniversary of Maurice



Ravel's birth when upcoming star, pianist Clara Siegle, who made her orchestral début at the age of nine, will be featuring some of his solo piano pieces. The late night concert that evening will include Ravel's violin and cello sonata written in the 1920s and dedicated to Debussy, while his scintillating Tzigane for violin and piano also completes the line-up at the Coffee Concert on Sunday morning.

The Festival Finale on the afternoon of Sunday 14th September marks the 250th anniversary of Jane Austen's birth with performances of some of her favourite works and readings from her note books and letters. Renowned tenor, James Gilchrist is making a return visit to the festival and will be joined by the Primrose Piano Quartet for an exciting premiere of a new work by Peter Salem, known for his extensive output of TV, film and theatre music (among them the ever popular "Call the Midwife").

Other festival highlights include a morning of Viennese string quartets in East Meon church and a programme of early French harpsichord music at Warnford church on Saturday afternoon. All other concerts are held in West Meon church.

Its acclaimed discography includes classical favourites as well as many unjustly neglected works by early twentieth century British composers. Their major commissions include piano quartets written for them by Sir Peter Maxwell Davies and Anthony Payne. The quartet appears regularly in London at Kings Place and the Conway Hall and has toured across Europe.

The quartet is a leading exponent of historically informed performance and its recording of the complete Brahms piano quartets, made in Vienna on authentic pianos of the period, was highly recommended on Radio 3's "Record Review".

Its latest CD of French nineteenth century piano quartets, also using an historic piano, was launched in April 2024.

## There's no growth on a dead planet

-Yet Part 3 of the Government's new Planning and Infrastructure Bill threatens to tear up decades of environmental protection under the illusion of fuelling economic growth, despite warning from the Office of Environmental Protection of undermining existing environmental safeguards, constituting a dangerous regression in law. The Bill proposes a radical shift. It wants to replace the existing system of nature protections with a series of Environmental Delivery Plans (EDPs). These would be funded by a Nature Restoration Levy paid by developers to offset their impact on nature. On the surface, this sounds like a win-win – money for nature and faster planning decisions. But in reality, it's a reckless gamble that could devastate our natural world.

Paying a simple levy to fund nature restoration sounds efficient but by allowing developers to simply 'pay to pollute,' the Bill dismantles three core pillars of effective environmental governance: the precautionary principle, the mitigation hierarchy (where harm should be avoided first before resorting to offsetting) and the polluter pays rule. It risks undermining essential protections for irreplaceable habitats and species, it creates loopholes, relying on vague 'improvement tests' and it shifts decision making towards political discretion instead of being science-based.

Drawn up by Natural England, EDPs are proposed as the mechanism for streamlining and delivering strategic nature recovery. However, these plans lack legal requirements to be based on up-to-date scientific evidence, provide no clarity on what constitutes success, and no guarantee they will deliver genuine improvements for nature. The consequences could be catastrophic.

The irony is painful. At a time when UK nature is so desperately depleted, and with just five years to meet critical national targets to halt biodiversity decline – the Government risks making things worse. Natural England have been starved of resources for decades - piling such critical new duties on them creates a system doomed to underdeliver. Hampshire & Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust doesn't oppose development, and we agree there are ways of streamlining delivery. We have proven that smart, efficient environmental mitigation systems can work: from the Solent Waders and Brent Geese Strategy to our Nutrient Neutrality programme. But these work within strong environmental frameworks, not by tearing them down.

Nature isn't a barrier to growth – it's the foundation of it. Thriving, biodiverse landscapes are critical to our food security, health, economy, and climate resilience. Ignoring this is dangerously short-sighted. We are calling on MPs to pause and rethink Part 3 of this Bill. Government must recognise that a healthy economy cannot exist without a healthy planet. There's no quick fix, and there's certainly no growth on a dead planet.

# New nesting tower gives swifts and house martins a lifeline

A specially designed nesting tower has been installed at Blashford Lakes Nature Reserve to support struggling populations of swifts and house martins. Swifts and house martins have experienced significant population declines in recent decades, due to habitat loss and a reduction in suitable nesting sites. The UK breeding population of swifts have declined by 66 percent between 1995 and 2022, while house martins have declined by 44 per cent.



Standing five metres tall, the tower features 23 swift boxes and 12 house martin cups, offering muchneeded breeding opportunities. It incorporates ventilation to keep the nests cool during warmer months and is equipped with solar panels and speakers to play pre-recorded bird calls, attracting young birds searching for a nesting site to settle into.

Swifts and house martins migrate from sub-Saharan Africa to breed in the UK, depending on suitable nesting sites and an abundant insect population. Historically, swifts have nested in the roofs of older buildings, but modern renovations are sealing up access points, leaving them without suitable breeding spaces. The new tower mimics natural nesting conditions, offering a secure, predator-free location, giving these birds a vital lifeline. Jack says: "Swifts and house martins are remarkable birds that complete incredible migrations from Africa each year. By providing secure nesting spaces at Blashford Lakes Nature Reserve, we're giving them a fighting chance to stabilise and recover. It's fantastic to see this conservation effort come to life."

The tower also provides easy access to a rich supply of insects, their primary food source. The wetlands, reed beds, and woodlands at Blashford Lakes Nature Reserve create perfect conditions for insects to flourish, ensuring the birds have the resources they need to thrive during the breeding season. Bringing this vision to life required a combination of expert knowledge, skilled design, and generous support, as Jack explains: "I'm incredibly proud of this project and would like to extend a heartfelt thank you to everyone who made it a reality. A special thank you goes to Hampshire Ornithological Society for their generous funding, Hampshire Swifts for their expert advice and guidance, and to Peak Boxes for their craftsmanship. "This tower represents a huge step in our ongoing conservation efforts to protect these vulnerable species, and we couldn't have achieved it without the support of our partners and the dedication of so many involved."

## West Meon CE Primary School

Our Summer term at West Meon School began with lots of activities in our glorious outside spaces. The whole school took to the field to play rounders as a reward for a great week of learning – this could only happen at a small school such as ours! We are also looking forward to our Sports Day on Thursday 12th June.

Students in Foxes and Owls classes are getting ready to go on their residential trips. These trips are an opportunity for children to reinforce friendships, and to challenge themselves to take part in activities they would not normally try. Our school value of Courage will be very much in use as children are encouraged to go just that little bit higher on a climbing wall, or just a little bit further on a trail. We are looking forward to hearing about their amazing adventures when they return.

In May, across the country, year 6 children were preparing for, and sitting, Standard Assessment Tests (SATs). This rite of passage was made more bareable (and dare I say, enjoyable) by the addition this year, of a Year 6 breakfast Club. Each morning, breakfast was laid on for our oldest students in a relaxed setting which made a great start to their day. This was a chance to chat to friends and allay any minor worries they may have had about the approaching challenges. At West Meon School, we view SATs as one small part of a child's educational journey. While SATs provide valuable insight into academic progress, they do not define a child's abilities, potential, or future success. Every child has unique strengths—creativity, kindness, resilience, and problem-solving—that cannot be measured by a single test. We remind children that effort and a love for learning matter far more than any single exam result. Our goal is to nurture confident, well-rounded individuals who are prepared for the future in many ways beyond test scores.

As part of our work exploring habitats and the local environment, Hedgehogs class welcomed some very interesting visitors – ducklings! It was great to see the children so carefully handling these tiny creatures, and treating them with respect. All the children enjoyed their time with their fluffy companions.

The first half of the summer term passed quite quickly as the West Meon team have been very active implementing new systems. Although we have been working for much of the year on altering our catering and wrap-around-care provision, both have come to pass now. Due to the imminent closure of Hampshire Catering Service, the school have been pro-active in sourcing a new partner to provide our catering needs. From the beginning of this month, Hungry Moose will be supplying amazing school dinners for West Meon.

In order to offer a more comprehensive after-school facility, we have teamed up with ActiveMe360 who will be able to provide a variety of activities and will completment our in-house Breakfast Club. Both these new partners will enhance our offering in this beautiful village setting.

As I write, Friends of West Meon School (FOWMS) are gearing up for their big event, a Charity Bingo and Raffle taking place in the village hall. We will be able to report how the evening went in the next Parish News. **JANE AUSTEN 250.** Throughout Alton's Regency Week (20-29th June) we are thrilled to be displaying an original silk "pelisse" coat, one of few surviving items that belonged to Jane Austen. Donated by a descendant of Jane Austen and now in the collections cared for by Hampshire Cultural Trust, the author's silk pelisse coat is one of a handful of items surviving today that belonged to Jane and can be traced directly back to her.
